Theme: Threats and Challenges to Identity of Adivasis

Background of the Conference:

All species, along with human beings in the so called progressive society, are facing threats and existential challenges for which they have to struggle for their survival on a day-to-day basis. The adivasi/indigenous people are among the most affected and at the receiving end compared to the other communities. As per the available data, India has the highest number of indigenous people (more than 700 groups) in the world after Africa. More than 50% of the tribal populations are below poverty (NSSO), more than 40% are illiterate, and about 40% of under-five tribal children are stunted (CNNS report), which is very high compared to the national average in India. Tribal have a unique culture that is so important for the next generation sustainable society and specifically for the global environment. It must be preserved not only for their identities but also for the human race. The problem has compounded due to displacement at the expense of globalization, industrialization, mining, building dams etc. Till date, more than 80% of the adivasi population in India lives in rural villages, where as a few have migrated to cities for a better livelihood. Among the city- migrated population, most of them are unskilled labours, and only a very few works in the government/public organizations and a negligible number in business/entrepreneurship. Although, particularly from santal community some have reached the highest constitutional including the current president of India Madam Smt. Draupadi Murmu, however, the challenges and threats of underprivileged santals remain same or surmounting over the period of time.

The existential threat and challenges in village and in urban are distinct. In the village, although to some extend the adivasi are able to preserve their cultural heritage but they are far lagging behind in the basic life sustaining amenities like housing, health care, connectivity, education, employment etc. Apart from these issues, there are chronic cultural problems within the santal community which has plagued the young mind on their path of socio-economic development. The burning challenges among these are how to remove black magic/witch hunt practices, minimize spending time in hat-pata, eradicate the consumption of ricebeer, eradicate the addiction of gambling, how to inculcate business practise/entrepreneurship skill and well-being among the village adivasi. Importantly, how to bring economic empowerment? On the other hand, most of the second and third generation adivasi people living in cities are disconnected from the mainstream culture. Many do not follow their culture, social values and rituals or never bother about what is going on with their village brothers and sisters. Along with the internal challenges, the external threats are still persisting in many parts of the rural adivasi regions. Some of them which requires coordinated attention includes exploitation by so called upper class Diku, land grabbing by outsiders, staunching religious places, religious encroaching, defiling and conversion by allurement, blocking reservations to needy and deserving or covertly snatching reservation facilities by other mainstream people.

The symposium will offer us a platform for our esteem members and their family, and distinguish personalities from santal and adivasi society to deliberate on the stated threats, challenges and issues, to find some workable solutions to a way forward in the future.

About SEA:

The SEA is a non-profit professional society of santal engineers registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 having member more than thousands with 13 chapters almost all metro cities in India and an overseas chapter. The organization is working restlessly on various welfare projects ever since its inception in year 1990 with the mission transform the santal society into a progressive and modern society, yet retaining its unique social-cultural identity, traditional values, universal human values, human identity through the process of educational, economic and socio-cultural rejuvenation.

- Environmental: Preserve the rich forest ecosystem inextricably connected with socio-cultural traditions of Adivasi. Plantation of Sal and other trees. Preservation of Herbal plants.
- Women Empowerment: Focus on women education, develop awareness and encourage them choosing career, jobs and entrepreneurship.

Every year, conference-cum AGM is organized in the month of December to appraise the members of various projects and works undertaken by SEA over the last year, and plans for future activities are discussed and deliberate on different social issues on the AGM day.
